

Vancouver Housing Market


- Clark County growing twice as fast as metro counties
- Deficit of **5,600** units
- 2% vacancy rate
- Rents increased 19% in 5 years
- 51% of renters cost burdened
- 4,886 new units in last 3 years, need 2,500 per year



Homelessness in Vancouver

2022 Point in Time Count

- 1,197 experiencing homelessness in Clark County;
- 625 are unsheltered mostly within City



Impacts

- Increase in visible homelessness (camps/vehicles/RVs)
- Increase in solid waste
- Negative impacts on mental and physical health of those living outdoors
- An average of 25 people living unsheltered die each year

Process

- Update Comp Plan
- Update code to promote density
- Update SF zoning

- Expand shelter capacity
- Expand investment tools, incl. AHF, fee-in-lieu & SDC waivers
- Leverage other public and private funding
- Pursue strategic land acquisition
- Invest in homeownership

- Expand MFTE to promote density
- Align infrastructure investment with high density housing
- Lower parking minimums and increase heights

- Maintain consistency and efficiency in permitting
- Establish clear and consistent building policies
- Explore process improvement

2022 Housing Outcomes





Affordable Housing Fund

- supported 171 new units, 100 for tenants under 50% AMI
- preserved 29 units
- stabilized 310 households
- built 20 shelter units, 40 beds
- operated 45 emergency shelter beds

Multifamily Tax Exemption

• incentivized 4 projects with **515** new units

Homelessness

- Outreach and street medicine
- Emergency shelter construction/operation
- Transitional housing/group homes
- Rental assistance with case management

Housing-focused

- Eviction prevention, legal advocacy
- Homeownership assistance land trusts
- Homeowner rehabilitation program

Addressing Impacts of Unsheltered Homelessness



- Rapidly increase shelter capacity
- Safe parking sites
- Encampment management strategies
- Solid waste mitigation
- Reduce barriers to accessing services



Safe Stay Communities

Alternative shelter communities offering residents greater access to services, increased stability, and safe, healthy, humane living conditions to support transitioning out of homelessness





- 20 Pallet shelters per site
- Office and meeting space
- Hygiene/sanitation services
- Fenced
- Staffed 24/7 by service provider
- 1,000' no-camping buffer



Safe Stay Communities

Two sites open, a third underway, two more budgeted to open in 2023

The Outpost's first year outcomes:

- 80 individuals served
- 33 housed
- 21 employed
- 30% reduction in calls for police in surrounding neighborhood
- 13% reduction in calls for other emergency services related to homelessness

Safe Park

C-TRAN Evergreen Transit Center



Safe Park provides:

- 55 vehicle/RV spaces for about 75 people
- Overnight security
- Restrooms, hygiene, nearby showers
- Service provider support (housing, employment, behavioral health, etc.)
- COV provides some tow services



Homeless Assistance and Resource Team





HART is a multidisciplinary team created to address and mitigate the impacts of unsheltered homelessness.

- Compassionate outreach to people living unsheltered
- Assessing camps for sanitation needs and coordinating cleanups/ sanitation services
- Connecting individuals in camps to needed services

- Point of contact for community members seeking response to issues related to homelessness
- Community education

Homeless Assistance and Resource Team

The team is led by the Homeless Response Manager, and includes:

- Outreach Specialist (CMO)
- Encampment Response Coordinator (Public Works)
- HART Officer (VPD)





Other Services







- Sanitation Stations at/near encampments
- Talkin' Trash
- Mail Service
- Community Court program participation

- Outreach on WSDOT Right of Way property
- Coordination with Economic Prosperity and Housing Department
